

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Common nouns can combine with determiners to their left




But not all determiner-noun combinations are grammatical:


- (1) a. a student
 - b. the student
 - c. * those student
 - d. * a students
 - e. the students
 - f. those students

Reason: the noun requires that the determiner agree with it!


Determiners and nouns have agreement features



Determiners and nouns have agreement features



Nouns select determiners that agree with them



Subject-verb agreement

Finite verbs select subjects that agree with them:


- (2) a. I smoke.
 - b. * I smokes.
 - c. I smoked.
- (3) a. You smoke.
 - b. * You smokes.
 - c. You smoked.
- (4) a. * She smoke.
 - b. She smokes.
 - c. She smoked.

Subject-verb agreement


Finite verbs select subjects that agree with them:

- (5) a. We smoke.
 - b. * We smokes.
 - c. We smoked.
- (6) a. You smoke.
 - b. * You smokes.
 - c. You smoked.
- (7) a. They smoke.
 - b. * They smokes.
 - c. They smoked.

Verbs select subjects that agree with them



Verbs select subjects that agree with them, 2




There are 4 more lexical entries for *smoke* (plus the infinitive) which only differ from the one above in having one of the following agreement values:

- second-singular
- first-plural
- second-plural
- third-plural

Verbs select subjects that agree with them, 3

There are six entries for the past tense verb form *smoked*. Here is the one for the third person singular:
